# LEARN AT LUNCH #1 Are you paid the going rate? 6 AUGUST 2020






# **Overview**


# Poll results






Poll 2: How far do you live from work?




Poll 3: What description best describes your adult working life? (n=32)




# Poll results (part 2)


Poll 4: Which banding do you think most clinical audit jobs are advertised at on NHS Jobs website? (n=31)



Poll 5: If you work in a team that at least in part undertakes clinical audit activity, what best describes what has happened to that team over the last 12 months? (n=31)




Poll 6: If your current job title includes 'clinical audit', do you think that this will still be the case in five years from now? (n=27)
